



Program Overview

This program fosters professionals who will be able to take leadership roles in planning and analyzing policies toward state building and economic development based on the knowledge and analytical skills of political science and economics

The National Graduate Institute for Policy Studies (GRIPS) aims to cultivate public policy leaders and professionals who will play key roles in democratic governance.

The State Building and Economic Development (SBED) Program is an interdisciplinary program designed for students who have a master's degree in an area of social sciences and are interested in interactions between politics and the economy in developing

countries and emerging economies. The program aims to develop talented individuals who are capable of research and policy formulation requiring advanced knowledge of both political science and economics and who will play key roles in democratic governance internationally.

GRIPS has implemented the Global COE Program entitled "The Transferability of East Asian Development Strategies and State Building" from 2008 to 2012, in which, as the program title indicates, political scientists and economists have promoted joint studies and fostered young researchers and technocrats who will design policies based on the knowledge gained from the results of the advanced studies. The Ph.D. program represents one of the achievements of the Global COE Program and is designed to continue and expand upon the human resource development initiated by the Global COE Program.

During the first year of this program, students take courses in political science, economics and history intensively to acquire advanced knowledge and analytical skills at the Ph.D. level of proficiency. In and after the second year, students concentrate on field work, archival research, analysis, and writing to earn a degree in three years. All courses in the program are offered in English. The dissertation, also to be written in English, must be relevant to state building and economic development, demonstrate a capacity for making original and significant contributions to the existing knowledge base, and deal with a policy issue or have a policy implication. Students who fulfill the requirements will be conferred a Ph.D. in International Development Studies. To help students acquire a good sense of what is actually happening on the ground in developing countries and emerging economies, each advisory committee comprises faculty members with a wealth of relevant experience in the

field and encourages students to conduct field work of their own. The committee not only guides students in the research process of planning, data collection, analysis, and writing but also helps them succeed in publishing journal articles and books.
