# **EMBASSIES**

With student networks, we were able to organize 6 embassy visits. They were Australia, China, Malaysia, South Korea, Switzerland and the Philippines.

#### Australia

Date: 25 August 2015 Number of delegates: 15

Australia was the first embassy that confirmed our visit. The tour started with a very warm greeting by the deputy head of the mission to Japan, Mr. Tom Connor followed by presentations presented by diplomats from various departments in the topics of political strategy, trade policy and resources and industry. Q&A session and networking activity were provided with Australian beverages and finger foods.



## South Korea

Date: 28 August 2015 Number of delegates: 23

The visit started with a brief introduction by a senior researcher at the South Korean Embassy, Ms Wonkyung Rhee. We visited a mini history museum, a Korean styled garden followed by presentation introducing Japan - South Korea relations and the challenges South Korea is facing. At the end of session, the embassy provided Korean lunch box during Q&A session with senior diplomats of the embassy.



## Switzerland

Date: 4 September 2015 Number of delegates: 18

Dr. Matthias Frey, the head of science and technology office of the embassy organized the seminar with topics in very interesting Swiss political systems, trade relations and education promotions. All delegates were also amazed by the hospitality offered by His Excellency, Ambassador Urs Bucher. During networking session, delegates enjoyed the simplism architecture design of the ambassador residence and luxurious food and ice cream made by professional in-house chef.



### China

Date: 8 September 2015 Number of delegates: 21

Chinese Embassy visit exceeded our expectation. The visit was organized by a young diplomat, Zhang Han. Delegates first went to a summit-talk styled room to experience the atmosphere, allowing delegates taking photo there. Then we were guided to a huge hall and greeted by more than 10 diplomats. Including the minister counselor, Rong Ying and the emcee, Xie Yunghui. There was not a seminar, instead, GRIPS delegates were divided into 4 groups to network with diplomats, making the discussion more interesting and lively. Chinese finger food were served during the discussion. Delegates were led to Chinese garden next to Ambassador's residence where the smell of peace between Japan and China could be felt.



# The Philippines

Date: 9 September 2015 Number of delegates: 14



Thanks to the arrangement by Ms Vanesa Sumera, the secretary to the ambassador. GRIPS delegates were able to enjoy the whole program. An embassy tour and history introduction were very well guided by Consul Dominic Xavier M. Imperial. His Excellency, the ambassador, Manuel M. Lopez delivered a very informative lecture to all delegates. Topics including Japan – Philippine relations, economic growth and tourism. GRIPS delegates were encouraged to ask many questions during Q&A session. The networking session were spectacular, delegates were treated with authentic Filipino food and drinks.

# Malaysia

Date: 10 September 2015 Number of delegates: 12



Fun chat is just not enough to describe the Malaysian embassy tour. Delegates were briefed on the topics of political system, multiculturalism, tourism and religious issues. During the Q&A session, numerous interesting questions were asked, such as politics, culture crossreligion marriage and Muslim related questions.
